

This is a detailed aeronautical chart of the Bern-Belp region in Switzerland. The chart is centered on the Bern-Belp airport (LSZB 1675) and shows various flight paths and altitudes. Key features include:

- Geographical Features:** The chart shows the Bernese Alps, including peaks like TMA BERN and TMA BERN. The city of Bern is also visible.
- Flight Paths and Altitudes:** The chart displays several flight paths with associated altitudes in feet (FT) and magnetic distances in nautical miles (NM). Key altitudes include 4000, 4500, 5000, 5500, 6000, 6500, 7000, 7500, 8000, 8500, 9000, 10000, and 12000.

The minimum vectoring altitude chart shows the lowest altitude for the approach / departure sectors of LSZB which may be assigned to an IFR flight under radar vectoring.

The chart may only be used for cross-checking of altitudes assigned while under radar vectoring.

Altitudes: LSZB QNH.

Transition ALT: 6000

Minimum altitudes over Swiss territory are calculated according ICAO norms (PANS-ATM Doc 4444 & PANS-OPS Doc 8168).

Minimum altitudes are protected for low temperatures to minus 4 degrees celsius (LSZB temperature).

Sectors indicated all 30°, distances indicated all 5 NM, based on ARP LSZB.

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
